

# Watch and listen – use Advent to concentrate on "now" By Rev'd Dr Bernard Minton



We have reached that time in the Christian year when clergy up and down the land complain that Advent has been engulfed!

Advent is supposed to be a season of thoughtful preparation and contemplation, when we think sombrely in crisp dark evenings about sin, death and judgement, preparing to meet our Maker as the cries of St John the Baptist echo in our ears. But Advent has been completely drowned out: by Christmas at one end, where cute baby Jesus meek and mild is surrounded by carols and pretty presents, warming even the most Scrooge-like of hearts; while at the other end, Hallowe'en and bonfires give everyone the opportunity for a different kind of fun, as people scare themselves silly with ghost stories in the dark, before gorging on sweets and letting off fireworks to scare the devils and indigestion away. The stillness and silence of Advent, with that slowly building sense of expectation and waiting, vanishes under the intensity of Hallowe'en thrills and Christmass joy.

Of course, this doesn't actually matter much. It's good to give clergy an opportunity to get grumpy *before* instead of *during* the Crib Service, before 'Away in a manger' gets too firmly embedded between the ears! The world won't end sooner if no-one sings 'O Come, O come, Emmanuel', the 'Matin Responsory', or 'Wake, O wake, with tidings thrilling' (though they happen to be my favourite pieces of choral liturgy). Advent doesn't really matter in the way that Lent does, or Easter. We could go straight from All Saints' to Christmass, without missing anything vital.

But we do miss something, all the same. Advent is about paying attention to where we are NOW, not where we could be, or want to be, or are afraid we might be. Advent is about recognising that something is going on NOW, at an incredibly deep level of creation, far below our normal senses. A buried seed is slowly sprouting; the tide is on the turn and the wind is changing, though we can't see these things as we wait on the beach in the dark. Something is building, imperceptibly slowly, that will transform both us and the world.

To see it we need to stop, look, and concentrate. We need to attend to the world beneath us, and examine our own hearts. Are we ready for what is coming? Can we feel it in the air? Will He break us when He arrives, or fulfil our deepest longings, making us burst with God?

Advent whispers, 'Listen carefully. Watch patiently. The dawn is about to break. This night is about to end. Get ready to live in the light. Get ready to see and be seen.' Maranatha; come Lord Jesus.

#### What does a Governor do?

Someone asked me recently "what does a school governor actually do? Surely Mr. Heather manages the school". That is a good question – and we are very fortunate that Mr Heather does indeed manage the school so well. However, school governors also play an important role in supporting and challenging the school leaders, and providing strategic guidance. I think the best analogy is that if Pulford school was a business, then Mr Heather would be the CEO and the Governing Board would be the Board of Directors. Unfortunately, the analogy ends there, as headteachers are not paid like corporate CEOs and the Board are all volunteers!

In general, the Governing Board represents the different school stakeholders — principally the parents and Local Authority. However, in the case of a Church of England Voluntary Assisted (VA) school like Pulford then the Church is also a key stakeholder, so the Diocese appoints a number of Foundation Governors on the recommendation of the PCC. I am proud to be one of these Foundation Governors, and having previously been a parent governor many years ago this provides a different perspective.

So what does a school governor actually do, and particularly a Foundation Governor? We meet regularly with the school leadership team to set and monitor the school's long-term vision and strategy, including curriculum, teaching standards, safeguarding and financial management. When required, then we are responsible for appointing the headteacher, and holding them to account for the performance of the school. We review the school policies and ensure that they comply with statutory requirements and are consistent with the school's Christian ethos. As Foundation Governors, we also liaise between the school and the church to support collective worship and religious education, and ensure that Christian values are embedded in school life.

VA governors have additional responsibilities compared to those in other schools. The Governing Board are the legal employers of all the school staff, and so we have more responsibility for recruitment, performance management, and disciplinary procedures. The governors are also responsible for setting and managing the school's admissions policy, ensuring that it is fair and transparent.

So while Mr Heather and the leadership team continue to run the school very effectively, the Governing Board also play an important role as custodians of both educational excellence and spiritual integrity, working with the school to ensure that every child flourishes academically, socially, and spiritually in a nurturing environment that is rooted in Christian values.

# The Growing Church





All Saints has the capacity to offer space and opportunity to a wealth of young musicians, helping them to grow and become the musicians of the future, contributing in orchestras, choirs, churches ... for decades to come.

There was one particular weekend at the end of September, when about 5 young organists, a young trumpeter, the choir, Young Singers ... all competed for space. The bench in the organ loft was polished to a shine as organists came in, did their thing, and slid off to make way for the next. Lindsay needed a spreadsheet and a dedicated Organ Practice Calendar Secretary.

In any given week, you will find some young organists are playing for services; others having lessons; choristers learning to sing, developing their musicianship and taking medals while the Young Singers Club explores musicianship in a more informal setting. Above all, young musicians are welcomed and given opportunities to perform.

Felix said: "I chose to play the Pie Jesu from Fauré's Requiem because we sang the 'In Paradisum' as the anthem that day. I felt good playing from the loft. When Preb. David was giving the blessing, I was thinking "I have to be ready for this; it's the first time I've played like this with just me and accompaniment.' When everyone clapped at the end, it felt amazing."

# Living God's Love

The final thought in this series which has explored the St. Alban's Diocese Vision Statement:

# "Make us Heralds" By Bill Webb

Get you up to a high mountain, O Zion, herald of good news; lift up your voice with strength, O Jerusalem, herald of good news; lift it up, do not fear; say to the cities of Judah, "Here is your God!" (Isaiah 40:9)

Before I embark upon the main theme of this article, it strikes me that we have sadly lost two of our contributors to the series during the year: Roger Collor ('The Meaning of Generosity') and Frank Reedy ('Making new Disciples'). It seems fitting that with them we were blessed to have the thoughts of one of the diocese's longest serving readers and one of the team's newest. May they rest in peace and rise in glory.

In this final article of this year's exploration of the Diocesan Living God's Love prayer and Vision, I shall be considering what might we mean when we pray "Holy Spirit, make us Heralds of Good News?" So, what is a herald? Well, in biblical terms, a herald is an individual who, particularly in Old Testament times, proclaims or announces important news or messages, often on behalf of a king or authority. The concept of a herald is deeply rooted in the biblical narrative, serving as a vital role in the communication of divine messages and the proclamation of significant events. For instance, in the Book of Daniel, a herald is mentioned in the context of King Nebuchadnezzar's decree regarding the worship of the golden image: "Then the herald loudly proclaimed, 'O peoples, nations, and men of every language, this is what you are commanded to do...'" (Daniel 3:4). Here, the herald serves as the mouthpiece of the king, ensuring that the king's commands are communicated clearly and authoritatively to all subjects.

In the New Testament, the concept of a herald takes on a more spiritual dimension, often associated with the proclamation of the Gospel (from the Old English word godspel, meaning good news). John the Baptist is a quintessential example of such a herald. He is described as the one who prepares the way for the coming of Jesus Christ, fulfilling the prophecy of Isaiah: "A voice of one calling in the wilderness, 'Prepare the way for the Lord, make straight paths for Him'" (Matthew 3:3). John's role as a herald is to announce the imminent arrival of the Messiah and to call people to repentance.

Jesus followed John's example of being a herald. At the beginning of his Galilean ministry, some of the people implored Jesus not to leave them. However, he was adamant that he must do so: "I must proclaim the good news of the kingdom of God to the other cities also, for I was sent for this purpose." (Luke 4:42-43). At the end of his post resurrection ministry, Jesus' great commission to the disciples included the command, "Go into all the world and proclaim the good news to the whole creation" (Mark 16:15).

In this season of advent, it is impossible not to think of Charles Wesley's, and probably my favourite, Christmas hymn 'Hark the Herald Angels Sing'. This is, of course, based on Luke 2:10-11: 'But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid, for see, I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, who is the Messiah, the Lord.""

As believers we are all called to be heralds of the Gospel, sharing the good news which the angels brought of Jesus Christ with all the world. As heralds of the Gospel, we Christians are called to proclaim faithfully and boldly the good news of salvation through Jesus Christ's life, death, and resurrection, which offers peace with God, new life, and eternal life to all who believe and, as Christ commanded the disciples, it is to be preached to all nations. Through God's only Son Jesus Christ a way has been made in the wilderness for His people to be with God and to be forgiven for their sins.

In Romans 10:15, in echoing Isaiah 52:7, Paul writes, 'And how are they to proclaim him unless they are sent? As it is written, "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!" The phrase is not literal but signifies that the messenger is considered beautiful because of the important and hopeful message they carry, which is 'Your God reigns!' We have been sent by Christ to proclaim the Good News, but how much do we aspire to those beautiful feet?

To finish, I think that it is worth returning to where we started and reminding ourselves of the full Living God's Love prayer:

Living God, draw us deeper into your love;
Jesus our Lord, send us to care and serve;
Holy Spirit, make us heralds of good news.
Stir us, strengthen us, teach and inspire us to live your love with generosity and joy, imagination and courage;
for the sake of your world and in the name of Jesus, Amen

If, as the Diocesan vision implores us, we are to go deeper into God, transform our communities and make new disciples, perhaps this is a prayer that we should be praying daily and then we might wait to see what surprises it brings.

# A Green Idea for Christmas Baubles for the Birds: decorate a tree for wildlife



Decorating an outdoor tree with healthy treats for local wildlife is a wonderful winter tradition that gives back to nature. It's a tradition that my children look forward to every winter. We often decorate a tree close to the Winter Solstice or Christmas Day but occasionally we adorn a tree in January or February when food for wildlife becomes quite scarce and winter weather harsh.

Preparing to decorate a tree for wildlife is a multi-day process in our home. We start by making homemade bird seed ornaments, then weaving popcorn-cranberry garlands and finally tying together fresh fruit and veggie bundles. Some years we don't get around to making all these things, and that's alright too. This tradition doesn't need to be complicated.

When deciding what to hang on your outdoor tree, it's important to choose healthy treats for the wildlife that lives in your area. We typically decorate our tree with birds in mind, but there might be other wildlife in your area. Add a few things for them too.

#### Healthy treats for birds and other wildlife would include:

Dehydrated fruit slices hung on a string (apples, oranges, pear)

Fresh fruit and vegetables hung on a string (apples, pears, berries, grapes, oranges,

banana and carrots)

Homemade bird seed ornaments or suet cakes Pinecone or orange birdfeeders

#### What NOT to feed birds and other wildlife:

Raw meat

Bread and cookies

Potato chips

Avocado

Chocolate

Table scraps

Mouldy or rancid bird seeds

- Choose a tree that is easy to access.
- Respect of any rules against hanging things on trees in local parks.
- Hang treats using materials that are 100% compostable (100% cotton, wool, twine or other nature materials that will decompose over time)
- Make sure to revisit the tree regularly and pick up any food that goes uneaten, falls to the ground or becomes spoiled.
